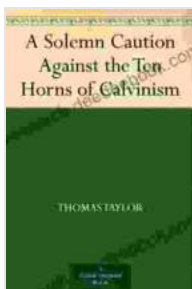

2. **Unconditional Election:** The belief that God has chosen certain individuals for salvation and reprobation before the foundation of the world, based on his sovereign will alone.

grace are futile. This can lead to a sense of hopelessness and spiritual abuse.

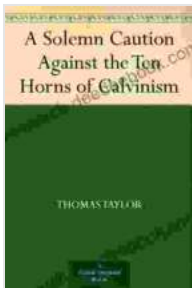
