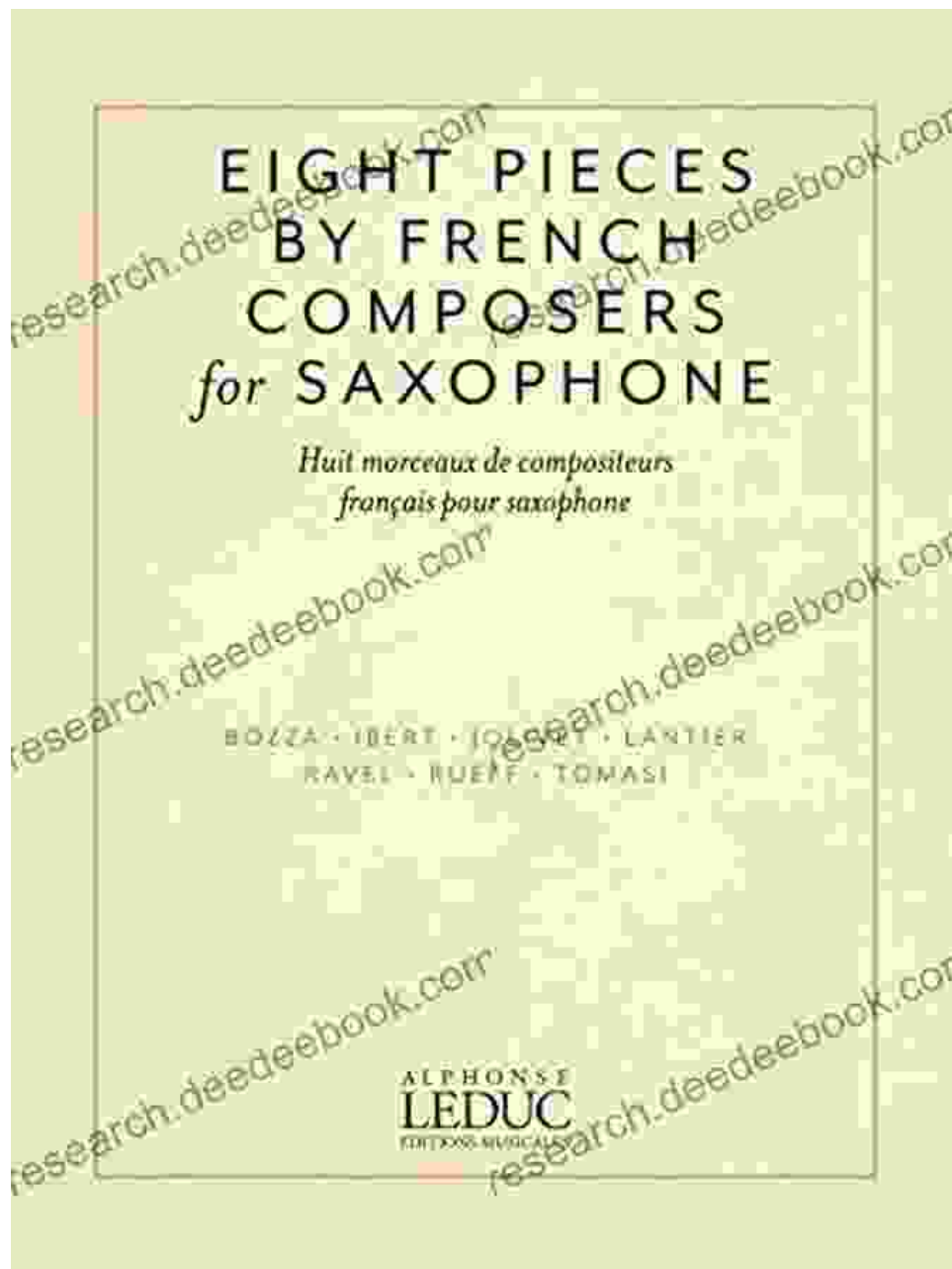
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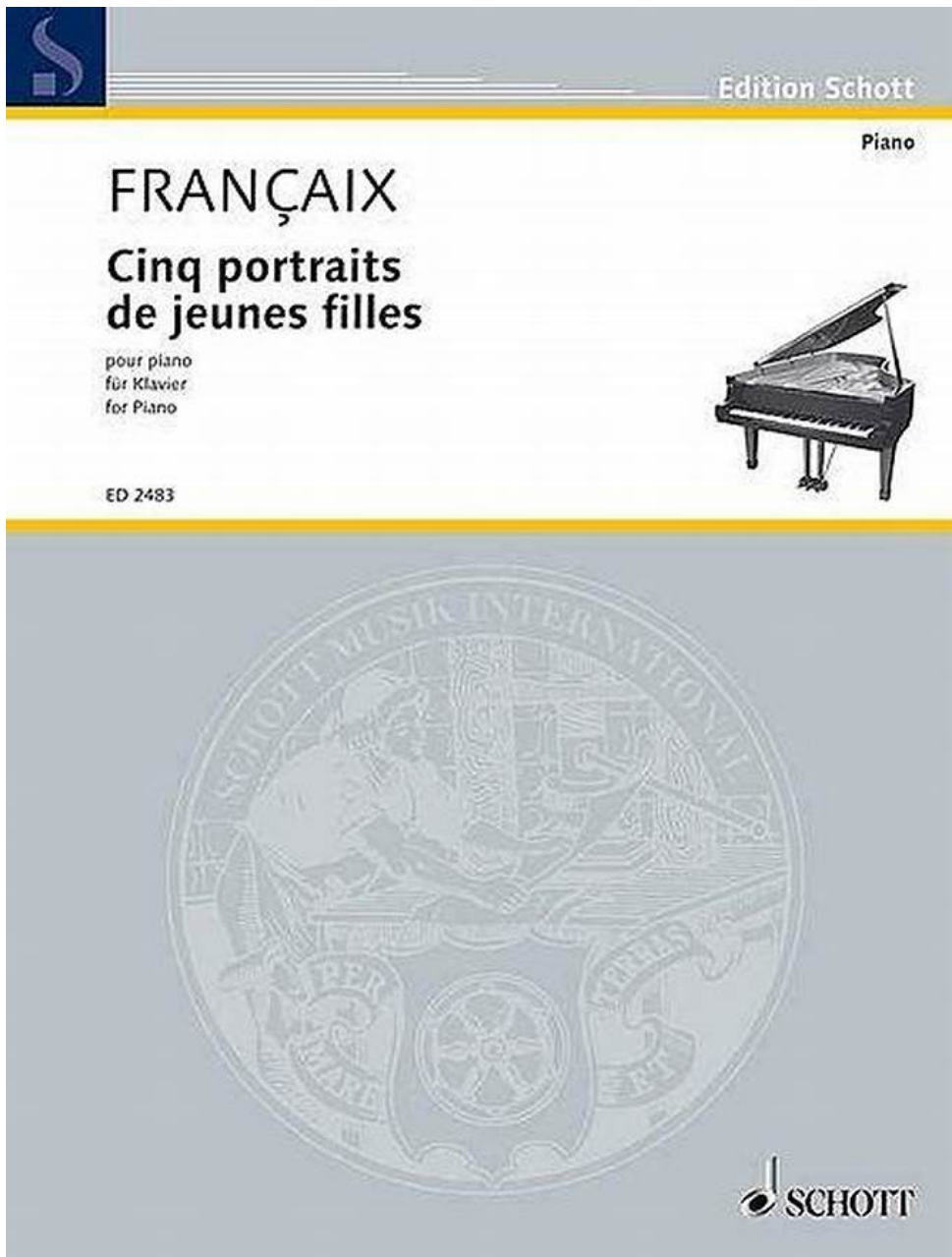


1. Claude Debussy: "Première Rhapsodie" (1910)



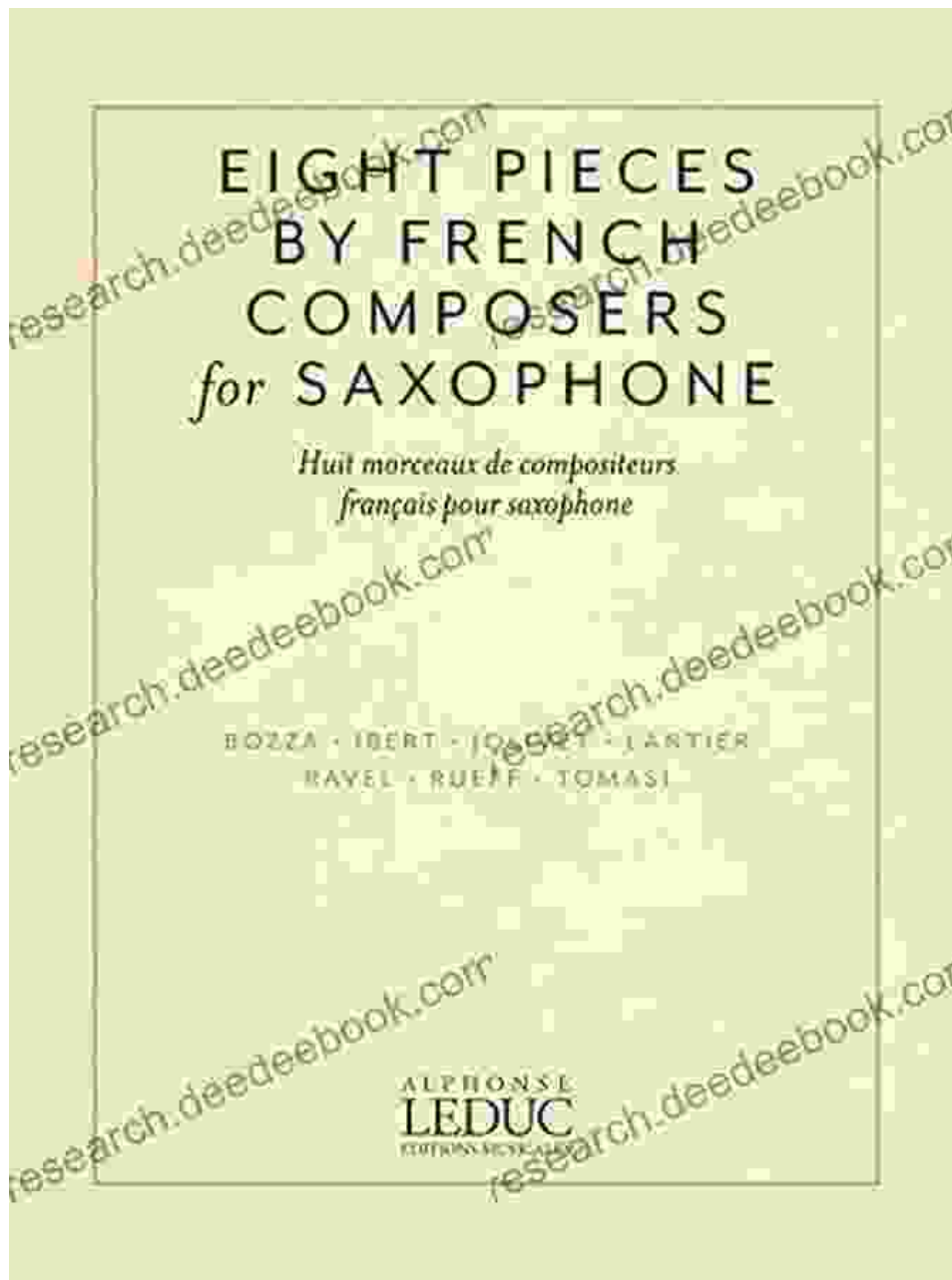

2. Jean Françaix: "Concertino pour saxophone alto et piano" (1948)



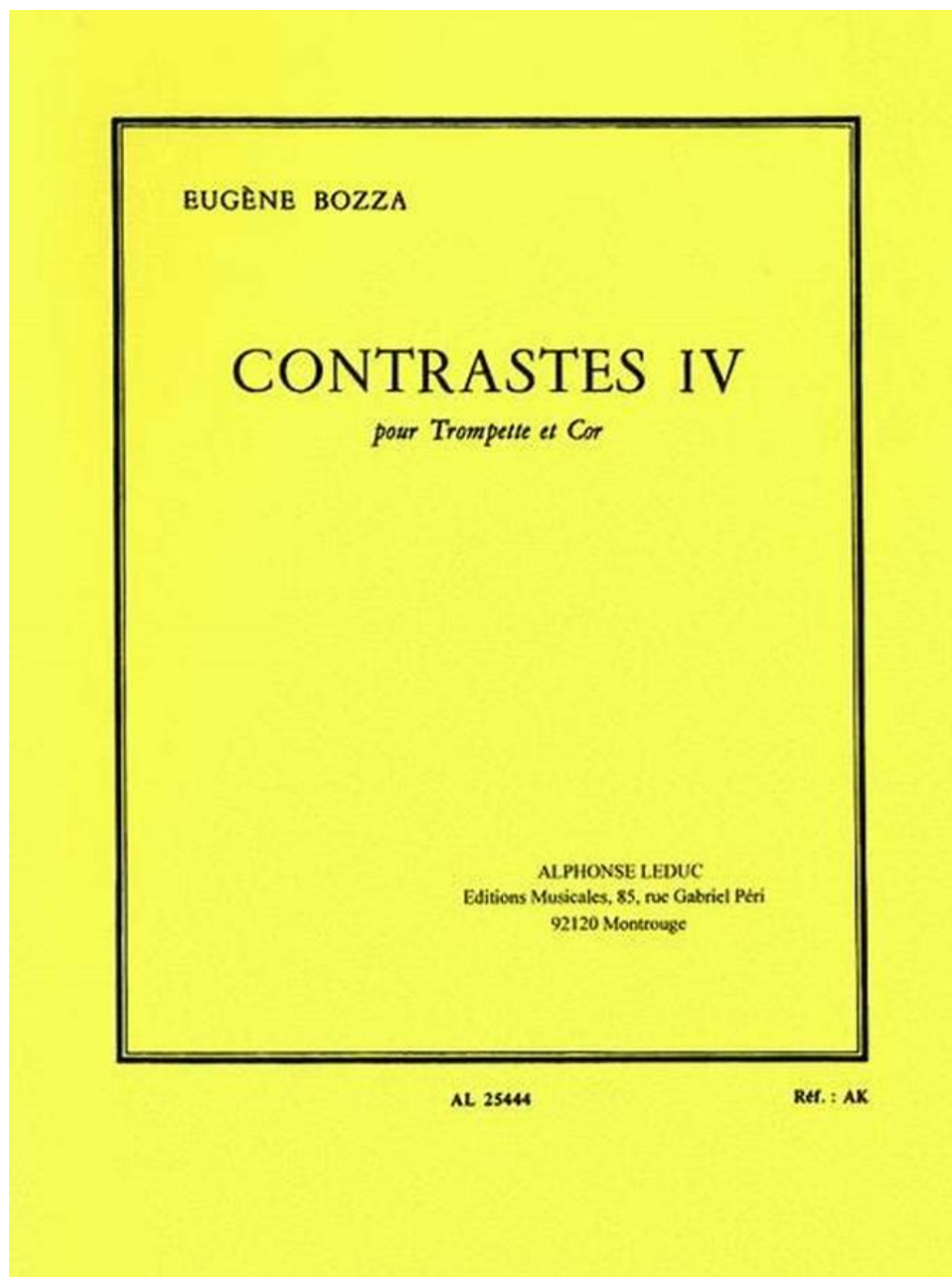

3. Jacques Ibert: "Concertino da camera" (1935)



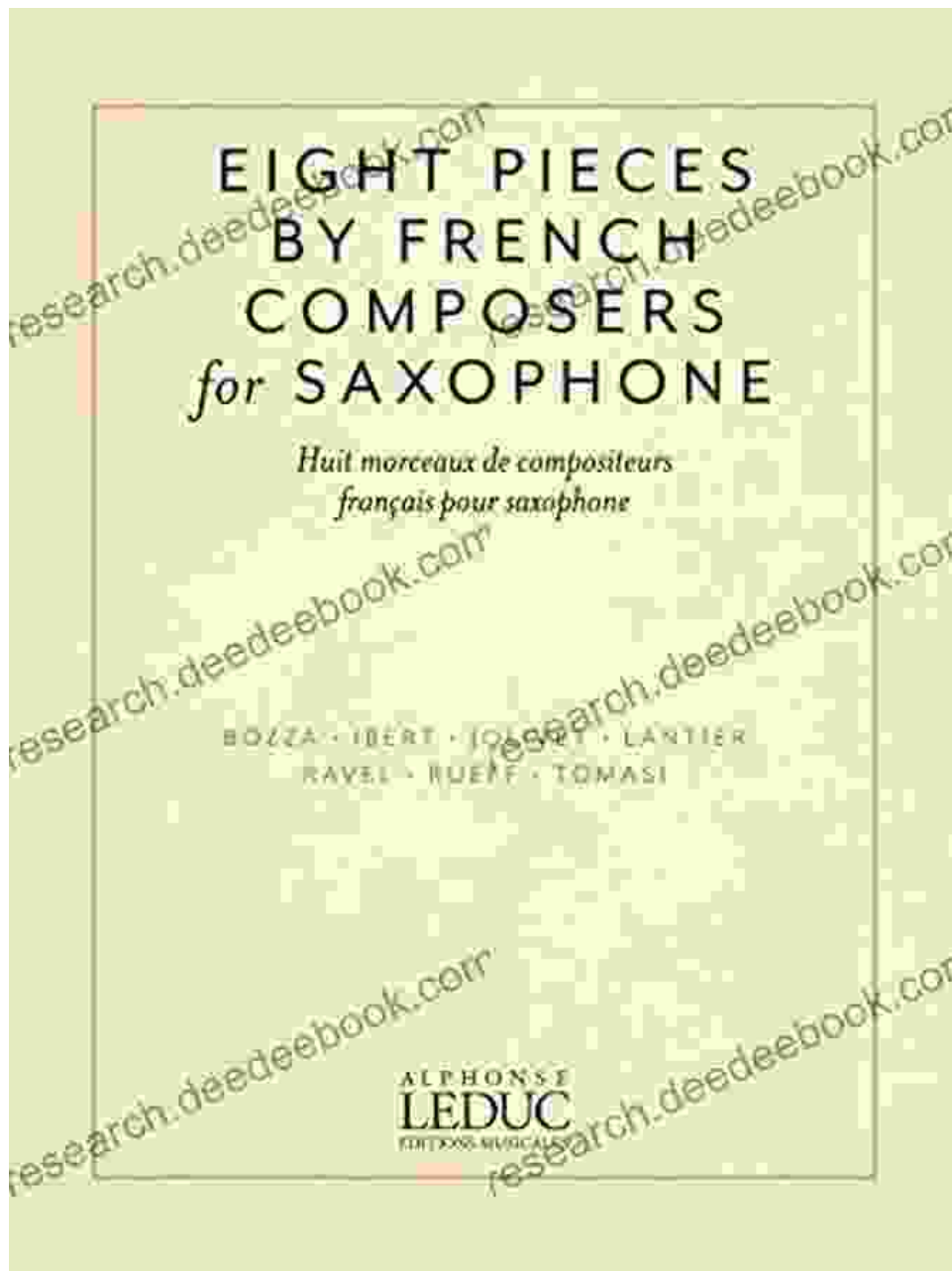

4. Eugène Bozza: "Sonatine pour saxophone alto et piano" (1943)



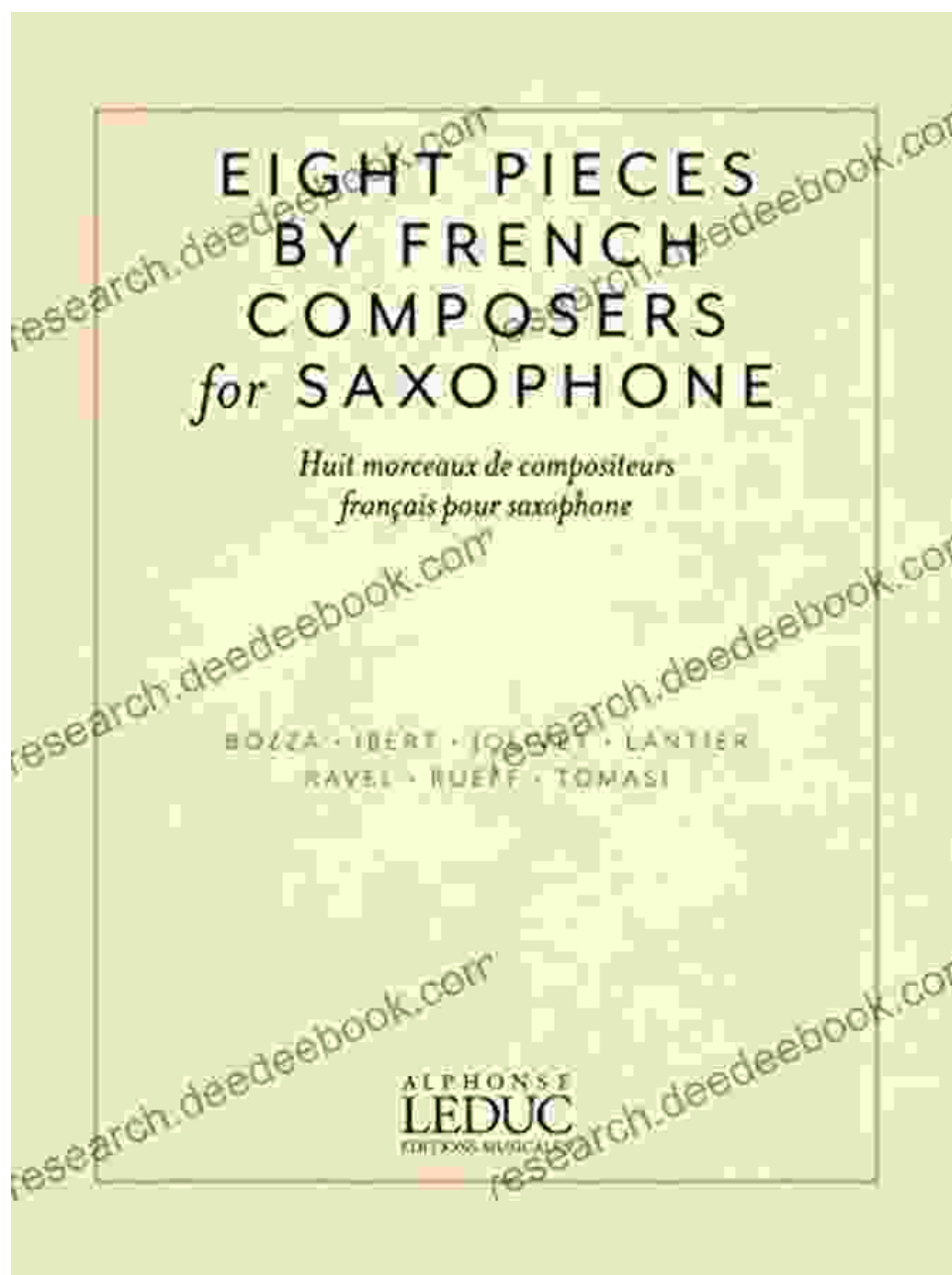

5. Henri Tomasi: "Ballade pour saxophone alto et piano" (1947)



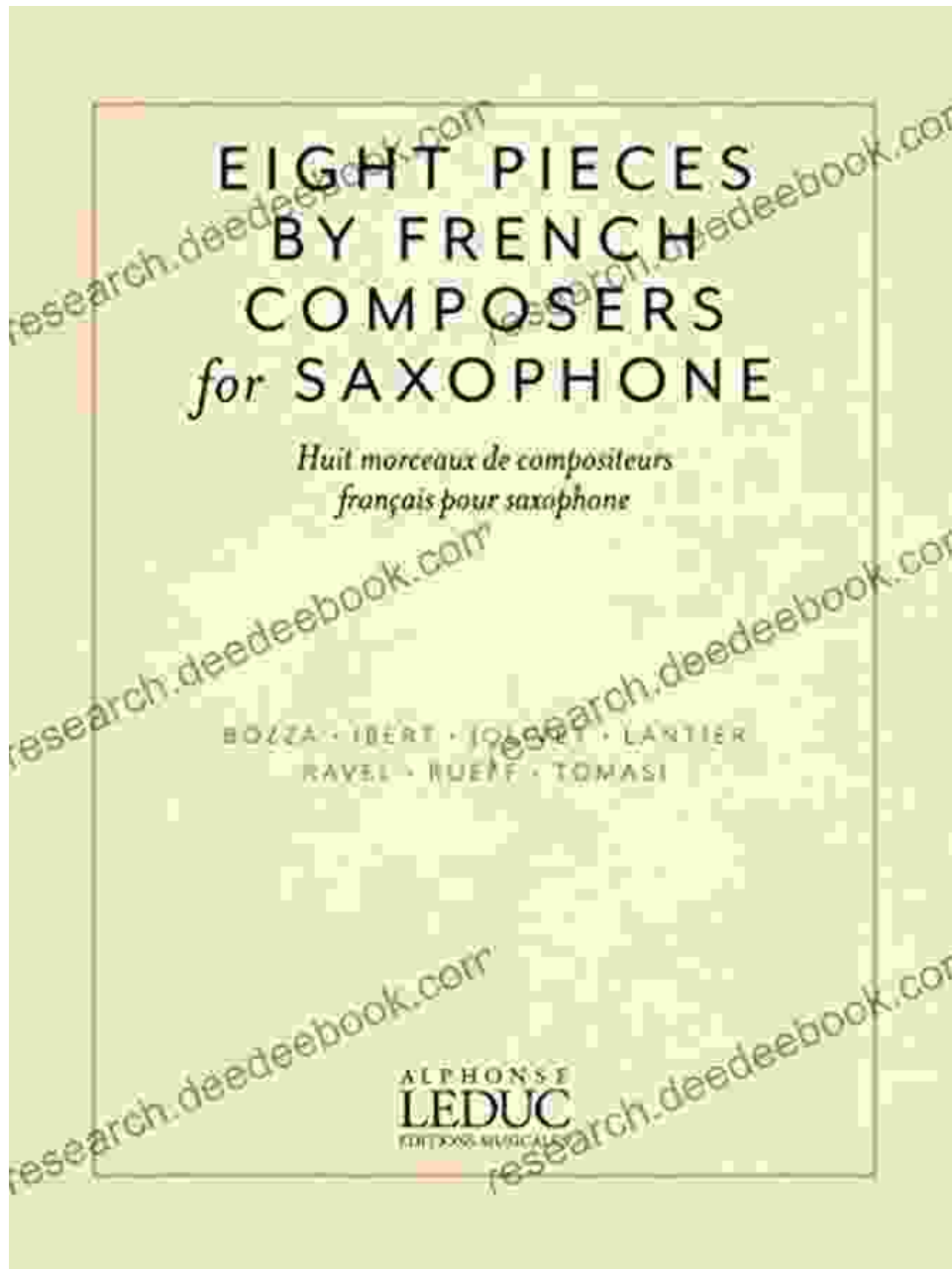

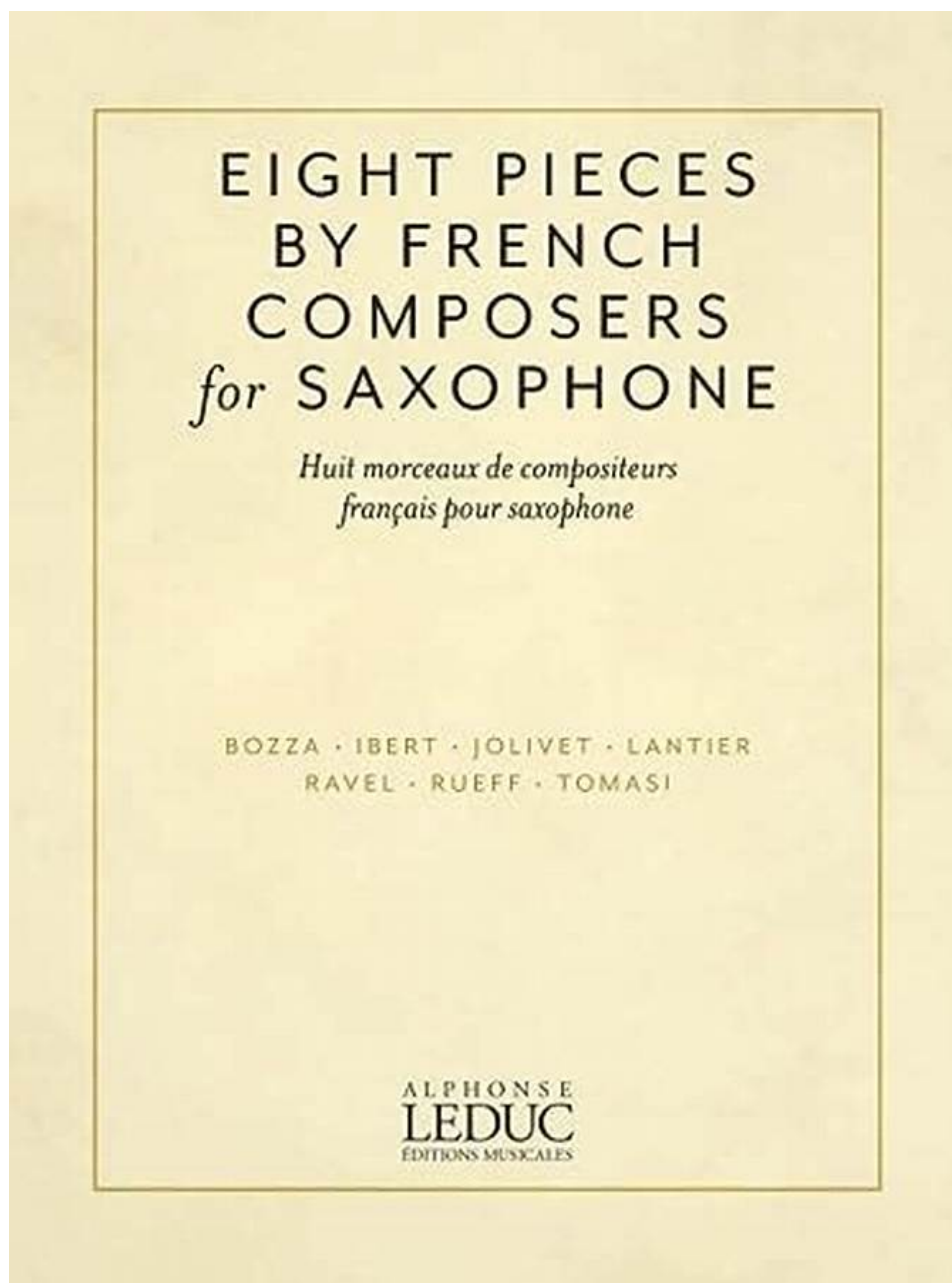
7. Francis Poulenc: "Sonate pour saxophone alto et piano" (1962)

musicians. The piano's delicate accompaniment and shimmering arpeggios add a touch of elegance and sophistication.



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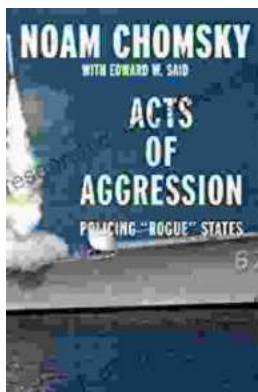
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
