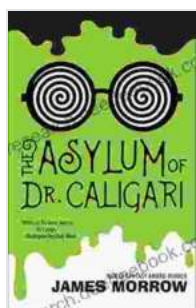


The Asylum of Dr. Caligari: A Chilling Exploration of Madness and Illusion

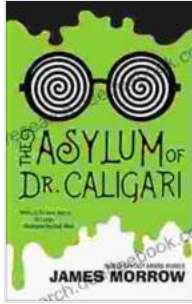

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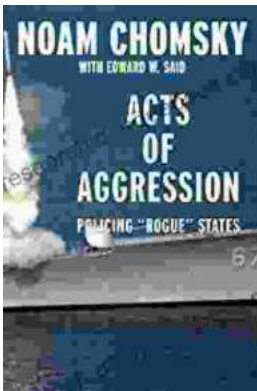


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
